The numismatic road less traveled. Two roads diverged in a yellow wood, and sorry I could not travel both. Those words by Robert Frost echo the sentiment of myself and other collectors trying to decide what to collect. Do I collect a set by date and mintmark or do I include proofs and varieties? If so, what varieties? Do I collect by type? Do I collect what is currently popular or go for an unpopular series that is currently undervalued? In my case the answer is in the following verse. Two roads diverged in a wood and I took the road less traveled by. And that made all the difference. Sicily's historic coasts. About a year ago former club president Mike Metras published a book on his month long journey on the island of Sicily. For over 3,000 years Sicily was a crossroad of ancient civilizations. Mike's compelling prose and photos bring the sights, sounds and even smells of the island to life. From Ancient temples to modern marketplaces his travel is described in great detail. Each chapter begins with a coin of the area he is currently visiting. My favorite chapter is the one of Syracuse where Mike comes upon a museum of coins containing hundreds of silver and gold coins. The cases he viewed contain some of the highest grade and most beautiful examples of Greek, Sicilian, Roman and Byzantine coins known. Unfortunately photographing the coins was not permitted and all we have is Mike's descriptions. I highly recommend this book and I could go on describing the contents but I have a sudden urge to go out for some gelato.

## Coin of the month

### 1846 Half Dime

This month's coin of the month is the 1846 half dime, part of the Seated Liberty series of 1837-1873. The coin was designed by Christian Gobrecht and measures 15.9mm and weighs 1.3 grams of 90% silver. The mintage of this coin is a mere 27,000 pieces making it one of the key coins of the series.

The E-Gobrecht newsletter rates the coin as the number one coin in the entire Seated Liberty series. They state due to the coins small size it is relatively unpopular and undervalued compared to the other Seated Liberty coins.

Most coins extant are lower grade and pieces grading over very fine are very scarce. Both PCGS and NGC have certified a total of three mint state coins with the finest a mint state 63. Values for this coin according to the PCGS price guide are Good \$550, Fine \$1,000, Extra Fine \$4,000, About Uncirculated \$7,500, Mint State 60 \$12,000 and Mint State 63 \$22,000. In 2006 an AU55 coin sold in a Heritage auction for \$6,325 and on August 10 2008 a damaged coin with a hole once worn on a charm bracelet sold for \$15.00
